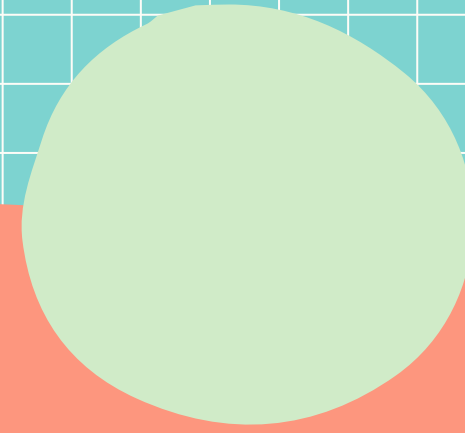
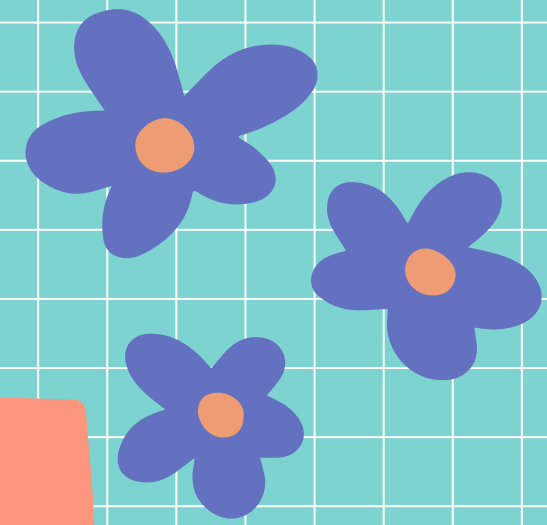


The Stone Age



It is a broad prehistoric period during which stone was widely used to make implements with an edge or point. The period lasted roughly 3.4 million years and ended between 8700 BC and 2000 BC with the advent of metal working.

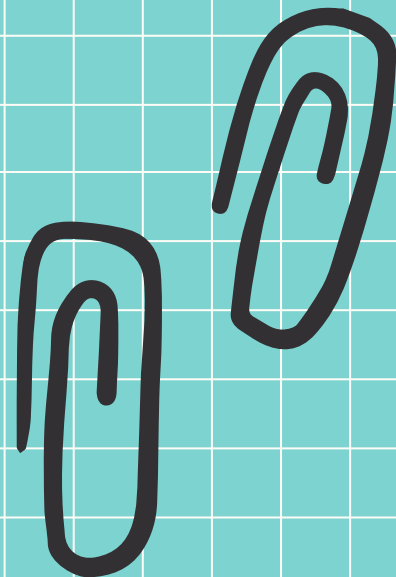




THE BRONZE AGE

It is a historical period characterised by the use of bronze and other early features of urban civilization.

The Bronze Age is the second principal period of the three-age Stone-Bronze-Iron system used for classifying and studying ancient societies.



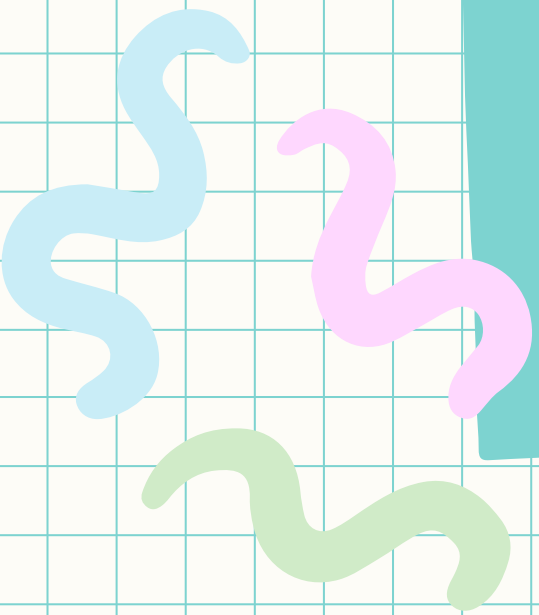
The Iron Age

It is the final of the three-age system.

Iron Age technology is characterised by the production of tools and weapons made from carbon steel, improved to the point where mass production was superior to their bronze equivalents.

In Central and Western Europe, the Iron Age lasted from 800 BC to 1 BC.
